Over Recent Weeks we've been looking at different prayers, at the people who prayed them and the circumstance behind them.

This week, to conclude our series, we look at the structure of God given prayers and attempt to write our own.

The question that remains is: "Is this a recipe for effective prayers?" The risk is that we take something that is good and try to use it to our advantage, but that's not how God works.

Despite what we learn about how to pray, God wants primarily to have a relationship with us. It is only through the relationship that a prayer will indeed become effective.

As St. James writes: "The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective". (James 5:16)

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

Old Testament Reading

Genesis 15.1-12, 17-18

¹ After this, the word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision: 'Do not be afraid, Abram. I am your shield, your very great reward.' ² But Abram said, 'Sovereign Lord, what can you give me since I remain childless and the one who will inherit my estate is Eliezer of Damascus?' ³ And Abram said, 'You have given me no children; so a servant in my household will be my heir.' ⁴ Then the word of the Lord came to him: 'This man will not be your heir, but a son who is your own flesh and blood will be your heir.' ⁵ He took him outside and said, 'Look up at the sky and count the stars – if indeed you can count them.' Then he said to him, 'So shall your offspring be.' ⁶ Abram believed the Lord, and he credited it to him as righteousness. ⁷ He also said to him, 'I am the Lord, who brought you out of Ur of the Chaldeans to give you this land to take possession of it.' ⁸ But Abram said, 'Sovereign Lord, how can I know that I shall gain possession of it?' ⁹ So the Lord said to him, 'Bring me a heifer, a goat and a ram, each three years old, along with a dove and a young pigeon.' ¹⁰ Abram brought all these to him, cut them in two

and arranged the halves opposite each other; the birds, however, he did not cut in half. ¹¹ Then birds of prey came down on the carcasses, but Abram drove them away. ¹² As the sun was setting, Abram fell into a deep sleep, and a thick and dreadful darkness came over him. ¹⁷ When the sun had set and darkness had fallen, a smoking brazier with a blazing torch appeared and passed between the pieces. ¹⁸ On that day the Lord made a covenant with Abram and said, 'To your descendants I give this land, from the Wadi of Egypt to the great river, the Euphrates.

- ⁹ O Lord, hear my voice when I cry: have mercy upon me and answer me.
- ¹⁰ My heart has said of you, 'Seek his face': your face, Lord, I will seek.
- ¹¹ Do not hide your face from me: or thrust your servant aside in displeasure;
- ¹² For you have been my helper:do not cast me away or forsake me,O God of my salvation.
- ¹³ Though my father and my mother forsake me: **the Lord will take me up.**
- ¹⁴ Teach me your way, O Lord: and lead me in an even path, for they lie in wait for me.
- ¹⁵ Do not give me over to the will of my enemies: for false witnesses have risen against me, and those who breathe out violence.

¹⁶ But I believe that I shall surely see the goodness of the Lord: **in the land of the living.**

¹⁷ O wait for the Lord; stand firm and he will strengthen your heart: and wait, I say, for the Lord.

Philippians 3.17-4.1

have us as a model, keep your eyes on those who live as we do. ¹⁸ For, as I have often told you before and now tell you again even with tears, many live as enemies of the cross of Christ. ¹⁹ Their destiny is destruction, their god is their stomach, and their glory is in their shame. Their mind is set on earthly things. ²⁰ But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Saviour from there, the Lord Jesus Christ, ²¹ who, by the power that enables him to bring everything under his control, will transform our lowly bodies so that they will be like his glorious body. ^{4:1} Therefore, my brothers and sisters, you whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, dear friends!

ON THIS DAY: The Iroquois Found John Brebeuf Brave



While still a Jesuit novice, John of Brebeuf prayed fervently that God would send him on a dangerous mission. As it turned out, his prayers were answered.

John was a French Norman with the courage of his forefathers. Selected to work in New France, he rejoiced. He arrived in

Quebec in 1625 and "went native," living in a wigwam. Beginning in 1626, he and another missionary worked for two years with the Huron near Georgian Bay, but had little success in converting the Indians. Brebeuf was recalled to France in 1629 when Britain got control of the French colony. But the French regained Canada in 1633 and Brebeuf returned to the scene of his labours and his eventual death.

It was heartbreaking work. A lesser man might have dropped aside. For the most part, the Indians were not very interested in Christianity. For sixteen years Brebeuf laboured among various tribes, gaining a small but growing success only among the Huron.

In 1648 the Iroquois attacked the Huron. John escaped death that year. In March of the following year, messengers raced to warn the Huron at St. Ignace and St. Louis that the Iroquois were on the war path. John could have fled. Instead, he helped women and children escape into the woods. Only the braves remained. They urged Brebeuf and his young assistant, Gabriel Lalemant, to flee. This was not their fight, they said. The Jesuits refused to go, although they knew they would be tortured if captured. They reasoned that now more than ever, the Huron needed spiritual counsel, baptism, and the last rites.

When the assault began, the two Jesuits raced among the men, shouting encouragement, urging them to pray, tending the wounded, baptizing the dying. The Iroquois prevailed, capturing Brebeuf, Lalemant and sixty Huron warriors, whom they beat and herded to St. Ignace. Brebeuf called on the Huron warriors to stay true to Christ until death.

Stripped naked, the Jesuits were tied to stakes and tortured with fire. Brebeuf suffered from noon until four p.m. on this day, March 16, 1649. When he would not scream out, but continued to pray for the salvation of his tormentors, the Iroquois heated cauldrons of boiling water and poured it over him in mockery of baptism. They cut and hacked his body, and gouged out his eyes. Before he died, they scalped him and cut out his heart, which they ate. Lalemant died of similar tortures early the next morning.





MY STORY – ELAINE SAMMIT

I was born the second child of seven children in the 1950's, a baby boomer. My parents were hard working and worked as market gardeners for mum's dad, my grandfather.

I was raised for the first three years of my life by my mum's mum, 'my dearest Nana'. Nan loved the Lord, her mother and my great grandma had migrated from London, England in the 1800's. Great grandma had worked with the poor alongside Catherine Booth, the first woman of the Salvation Army.

Great grandma was a Salvation Army Soldier in London. Nan and her brothers and sisters were raised as God fearing but loving Christians. Nan raised me the same way. She was very loving and nurturing to me.

My Nan taught me about Jesus, told me His story, how Jesus loved me and would always be with me. Nan taught me prayers. 'The Lord's Prayer' and the bed time prayer 'Now I lay me down to sleep' are just two of them.

Nan would take me to St Stephens High Church of England, which was opposite her home. Every Sunday was church, whether it was Sunday school, an Evening service, or Family Sunday service with Communion. I received my Holy Confirmation at St Pauls Cathedral in Melbourne.

The 50's were hard years for children, as children were seen but never heard. I learnt this myself when I was three years old and became a victim of a bad man. Fortunately Nan comforted me and listened but sadly no-one else did, even Dad and Mum believed the man (an Uncle) that I was telling fibs. My Nan did hold her ground with my parents though, banning that uncle from visiting again.

I was 8 when my Nan died. My grief was immense. I felt so alone and I was so angry at God for taking my Nana. To this day I grieve for the Nana I lost, and for the life I could have had, had she lived longer. Nan seeing me grow-up, enter womanhood, and helping me to be a good Christian and know God's Son.

I do know, and believe with my whole heart that Jesus and Nan, with all my Christian family, wait for me to die and enter Heaven.

I started High School, but sadly at 12 my Uncle abused me again. The anger and uncleanness that I felt towards myself was overwhelming. I became unruly, nasty and out of control. I wagged most school days. No stranger would tell me to go to school and not cop a mouthful of foul language from me.

Sometimes I would hitch hike to St Kilda. In St Kilda I met a man who was a biker. I was yelling at some boys to get away from me when this man intervened and chased the boys off. I thanked him. Steve at the time was 23. He became a friend but he really was more like a big brother. Steve told me he had a sister who would have been my age, had she lived – she died of type 1 diabetes at the age of 7. Upon reflection, I now realise that I became his little sister. He protected me, told me off when I swore and made sure I was safe.

I know this is a glimpse of my early years, but in that short time I realised that my God, who my Nan had taught me about, was real. With grief and anger I had distanced myself from Him. He didn't cause my grief or my uncle to abuse me. In every challenge that has happened in my life, God is always there. I believe that HE will never allow me to be hurt but, with every challenge, will provide the safe answer to my situation.

For now, I will end this testimony. It is only a small glimpse of my life showing you the reader, how my God – Father, Saviour and Holy Spirit have become my EVERYTHING.
